

Preservatives in Food.

REGULATIONS, DATED THE 17TH DECEMBER, 1929, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF HOME AFFAIRS FOR NORTHERN IRELAND FOR AMENDING THE PUBLIC HEALTH (PRESERVATIVES, ETC., IN FOOD) (NORTHERN IRELAND), AMENDED NO. 2 REGULATIONS, 1927.

The Ministry of Home Affairs in exercise of the powers conferred upon it by the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, (a) the Public Health Act 1896, (b) the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1896, (c) the Public Health (Regulations as to Food) Act, 1907, (d) and the Butter and Margarine Act, 1907, (e) and of every other power enabling it in that behalf, with the consent of the Commissioners of Customs and Excise, so far as they apply to the officers of Customs and Excise, hereby makes the following Regulations, that is to say :—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Public Health (Preservatives, etc., in Food) (Northern Ireland) Amendment Regulations, 1929, and these Regulations and the Public Health (Preservatives, etc., in Food) (Northern Ireland) Regulations, 1927 (hereinafter called “the principal Regulations”), the Public Health (Preservatives, etc., in Food) (Northern Ireland) Amendment Regulations, 1927, the Public Health (Preservatives, etc., in Food) (Northern Ireland) Amendment No. 2 Regulations, 1927, the Public Health (Preservatives, etc., in Food) (Northern Ireland) Amendment No. 3 Regulations, 1927, and the Public Health (Preservatives, etc., in Food) (Northern Ireland) Amendment Regulations, 1928 (which four last-named Regulations are hereinafter called “the amending Regulations”) shall be construed together and may be cited together as the Public Health (Preservatives, etc., in Food) (Northern Ireland) Regulations, 1927 to 1929.

2. The principal Regulations as amended by the amending Regulations shall have effect subject to the following further amendment :—

The 1st day of January, 1931, shall be substituted in Article I of the Principal Regulations for the 1st day of January, 1930, as the date on which the Regulations shall come into operation so far as they relate to cream, or any article of food containing any preservative which is necessarily introduced by the use in its preparation of preserved cream.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH (DERATISATION OF SHIPS) REGULATIONS (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1929, DATED THE 12TH DAY OF OCTOBER, 1929, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF HOME AFFAIRS FOR NORTHERN IRELAND UNDER SECTION 148 OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH (IRELAND) ACT, 1878, THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1896, AND THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1904.

The Ministry of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, in exercise of the powers vested in it under Section 148 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, the Public Health Act, 1896, and the Public Health Act, 1904, and of all other powers enabling the Ministry in that behalf, after consultation with the Board of Trade, hereby makes the following regulations:—

Short Title and Commencement.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Public Health (Deratisation of Ships) Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1929, and shall come into operation on the first day of January Nineteen hundred and thirty.

Interpretation.

2.—(1) The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies to the interpretation of these regulations as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

(2) In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires—
“The Ministry” means the Ministry of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland;
